Walk through any of CentraCare's clinics, hospitals or long-term care facilities, and you will see an increasingly diverse group of patients, physicians and employees.



Of the approximately 700,000 residents in our 12-county region, approximately 7,000 are black; 4,000 are American Indian or Alaskan Native; more than 7,000 are Asian; and some 11,000 individuals identify themselves as either "other race," which includes Latinos, or "two or more races." Further evidence of the changing demographics of our region: In 2000, 5.4 percent of the students in the St. Cloud school district were students of color; today, that figure is 25 percent.

As a health system, we are working to ensure that we are sensitive to the needs and expectations of our community. The system's Diversity & Inclusion Committee works to help us with diversity issues, and has been planning for the changes in area demographics that will affect health care delivery in future years.

During this past year, CentraCare held four "Marnita's Table" events for executive leaders, diversity committee members and culturally diverse staff. The events use a concept called "Intentional Social Interaction," designed to spark lasting relationships, bridge cultural differences and bring people of all ages, ethnicities and backgrounds together for the common good. Those who attended were delighted with their experience, and all had input into the vision and strategic framework that the Diversity & Inclusion Committee will use.

The system's cultural competency specialist, Rosemond Owens, has made great progress in raising the awareness of CentraCare leaders, physicians and front-line staff. She also has made countless connections with diverse groups throughout the community. This will help us better understand our patients' needs and better use the resources around us.

Short Stay program features onsite physician

St. Benedict's Senior Community's (SBSC) Short Stay Care program offers many unique features and services that are unmatched in Central Minnesota, including an onsite medical director — Internal Medicine physician Tamara Congdon, MD.

"It's such a benefit for patients and staff to have Dr. Congdon onsite," said Jen Nelson, LPN, who has been at SBSC for eight years. "We have an excellent team of nurses. We have great patients. I love visiting with the patients. I learn something new every day."



The Short Stay Care program offers comprehensive health services for individuals with complex medical problems who no longer require the acute care provided in hospitals. Patients may be recovering from fractures, joint replacements, pneumonia, stroke or multiple medical problems. Most patients stay less than 30 days, with an average stay of 12 days.

Caregivers include a case manager and a discharge planner, who are dedicated to meeting the needs of the patients. These individuals work with other professionals who have expertise in short stay care, including nurses, occupational, physical and speech therapists, and specialists in the areas of therapeutic recreation, nutrition and psychology. Because many of the Short Stay patients need intense levels of physical therapy, our program offers therapy two times a day, seven days a week.

The following excerpt is from a patient's discharge survey: "My experience here could not have been better! Everyone, regardless of their job description, has been very helpful, concerned and friendly. My questions were answered to my satisfaction. All meals were delicious. Physical therapy and occupational therapy personnel were friendly and dedicated — I wouldn't be leaving today if not for them. I would definitely recommend SBSC without hesitation."

St. Cloud Hospital recognized as distinguished hospital

St. Cloud Hospital is among seven Minnesota hospitals designated as Distinguished Hospitals for Clinical Excellence (DHCE) by the latest HealthGrades study. The other designated Minnesota hospitals are:

A total of 269 United States hospitals ranked as DHCE this year. Thirty-six states have at least one hospital so designated.
