

By day the chattering mowers cope With grass decreed a final winner. Darkness delays. The skipping rope Twirls in the driveway after dinner.


> Through lupine-lighted borders now For winter bones Dalmatians forage. Costly, the spray on apple bough. The canvas chair comes out of storage;

# EMPLOYEES BENEFIT FROM RETIREMENT PLAN



The Retirement Income Plan is one section of a two-part retirement-insurance plan provided by the Sisters of St. Benedict of St. Joseph, Minnesota for all those employed by them in their major institutions. This benefit is made possible through an arrangement with the Connecticut General Life Insurance Company.

The highlights of the plan are:

. . . no cost to the employee.

. . . pension payable for life.

 pension benefits may be continued to a dependent.

. . . benefits are in addition to social security.

Two of our hospital employees have retired within the past three months and have become the first to obtain the financial benefits of our retirement plan.

MIKE JAEGER (pictured) was the first to retire since the plan went into effect on June 1, 1959.

Mr. Jaeger was employed in the laundry since May, 1944 and retired March, 1961 after seventeen years of faithful service.

The second employee to benefit from the plan is HERMAN SCHNEIDER, our former Chief Engineer. (More about Herman on next page).



## AUF WIEDERSEHEN

Goodbyes between old friends are always difficult. The German expression saying, "'Til we meet again," softens the blow--and for this reason we use it in bidding farewell to a faithful employee of many years' acquaintance, MR. HERMAN SCHNEIDER.

In 1907 Sister Placida, O.S.B., who was in charge of St. Joseph's Home in St. Cloud, returned to Germany to visit relatives there. While in Baden, Germany, Sister told her nephews, the Schneider boys, that she was greatly in need of an engineer for St. Joseph's. Herman was then a boy of fourteen, but the challenge of the "New Country" interested him and he immediately volunteered to help his aunt in far-away St. Cloud. He boarded the German ship, Vaterland, as a third class passenger and, after a miserable, seasick voyage, arrived in the U.S. He came to St. Cloud on December 6, 1907--the Feast of St. Nicholas.

Herman worked at St. Joseph's that first winter and the following summer went to Saint John's in Collegeville to train under Brother Gregory for a year. He then returned to St. Joseph's for five years, after which he accepted a position at the St. Cloud Reformatory. During his employment at the Reformatory, Herman continued to assist at odd jobs at St. Joseph's Home, St. Raphael's Hospital and St. John's. After eleven years at the Reformatory, he spent two years getting additional experience in machine shop work and one year in plumbing.

On May 1, 1927, at the request of Mother Cecilia, O.S.B., and Sister Julitta, O.S.B., Administrator of the new St. Cloud Hospital, Herman Schneider accepted the position of Chief Engineer of the large, new building at that time under construction. This position Mr. Schneider held for thirty-four years until his retirement on May 1, 1961.

No fine food It is difficult to summarize Herman's contributions to our hospital. His devotion to and respect for his Benedictine aunt have been extended to the many Benedictines he has worked with after his arrival in St. Cloud. His years of self-sacrificing service have made him an unforgetable figure in the history of the St. Cloud Hospital. Retired now to his favorite hobby of home landscaping and rose gardening, we are sure that in spirit he remains a part of the hospital family--and he is not so far away that we shall not meet again!





### THERMIA UNIT GIVEN BY MRS. JAYCEES

A few critically ill patients have already benefited from the Thermia Unit which was recently purchased. Funds for this equipment were generously donated by the Mrs. Jaycees who annually contribute to some charitable cause. This year the St. Cloud Hospital was their beneficiary.

The Thermia Unit utilizes thin pliable vinyl blankets which drape easily for either raising abnormally low body temperature as in shock, or reducing abnormally high temperature. The compressor-heater unit will operate up to four blankets or units at one time in the range of 40 to 80° Fahrenheit or in the range of 80 to 120° Fahrenheit. The electronic control automatically maintains any pre-set temperature, compensates electronically with either heat or refrigeration as needed when variance is as little as twotenths of a degree.

The unit is invaluable for heart surgery, chest or lung surgery, brain and spinal cord surgery, pediatric surgery and accident patients. Members of the medical staff who were consulted regarding the purchasing of this equipment cited instances in which this contribution would be invaluable in the care of critically ill patients.
