is of more value? The flashlight for your own personal use or the life of every person within these hospital walls!

SAFETY___

To be SAFETY CONSCIOUS is the DUTY of EVERY person working in this hospital. Safety to patients, visitors, our fellow workers and ourselves is essential in the functioning of every hospital. There are many areas which could be treated — this month we will concentrate on the dispensation of medications:

1. Identify the Medicine under a good light. Concentrate on what you are doing!

2. Never give medicine from an unmarked container.

3. Do not tamper with labels. Your "fix up" job NF may mean the death of a modicine patient!

4. In the actual administration of a medication,

READ the label three times:

- a. When taking the medication from the shelf.
- b. Before measuring.
- c. When replacing the medication on the shelf.

KEEP LABELS CLEAN!

To identify the patient before the administration of the medication, address the patient by name and get a positive response. DO NOT ADMINISTRATE drugs which have been selected and measured by another person.

MEETINGS_

SISTERS GORETTI and CARMEN attended a conference on "The Evaluation of Nurse-Patient Relationships" on February 5 which was presented by the Minnesota League for Nursing at the Lutheran Brotherhood Building in Minneapolis.

An Institute on Clinical Dietetics at the University of Minnesota Center for Continuation Study was attended by SISTER COLLEEN on Feb. 5-6. Sister comments that it was an excellent institute; a good review of diet therapy and the discussion groups brought out suggestions on what others are doing with problems peculiar to our situations.

The Minnesota Institute for Hospital Administrators conducted by the University of Minnesota with the cooperation of the Minnesota Hospital Association and the American College of Hospital Administrators from February 16 through 20 at the Center for Continuation Study of the General Extension Division of the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, was attended at various sessions by SISTERS JAMEEN, ROSALINDA, DELELLIS, AMARITA, LEO, GORETTI, LEONELLE and MR. HARRY KNEVEL and MRS. E. MERKLING. The discussions centered around General Administrative, Legal, Accounting, Nursing (Intensive Care), Personnel and Hospital Problems. It is through the attendance of Institutes such as these that our people are able to "keep up" with the "changing times" and acquire some knowledge of what "others" are doing in their respective departments.

SISTERS AMARITA and DELELLIS and MRS. E. MERKLING attended a meeting of the Minnesota Chapter of American Association of Hospital Accounts held at Mt. Sinai Hospital, Minneapolis on Feb. 26. The topics discussed were: Current Hospital Problems, Cash Receipts and Accounts Receivable, Cash Disbursements, Inventory Control Payroll and Personnel.

AUXILIARY ——

During the month of February, members of the St. Cloud Hospital Women's Auxiliary attended two special lectures as part of their hospital orientation program. On February 4. Sister Jameen addressed the group on the objectives of the hospital--1) To treat with sympathy, kindness and understanding all who are sick, realizing that sickness and hospitalization may be a new and trying experience for them; 2) To provide the patient with the best possible care exemplifying Christ's charity to all, regardless of race, color, creed or economic status; 3) To provide, the Medical staff with adequate facilities for the care of their patients; and 4) To improve, by educational activity, the practice of medicine and nursing ser-

Mr. Knevel enlarged on the role of the auxiliary in the hospital as it reaches out to the community. As he explained the internal hospital organization, he brought out again the fact that the auxiliary is a community group, organized to bring to its members -- and through the members to the community -- a full knowledge of the hospital's services, the hospital's needs and an understanding of the entire hospital program. The auxiliary should stand ready to provide support to the hospital in its community relations, to bring the "plus" factors of volunteer service to the personnel and patients of the hospital and to open new financial resources to the hospital.

The following evening, February 5, Father Riley gave a lecture on "Professional Secrecy", stressing the inherent right of the patients to their privacy.

The department heads met with the volunteers after their regular monthly meeting to give their groups a departmental orientation. The first of the ladies actively engaged in the "in-service" program reported for duty in the easily recognized "cheery, cherry" red uniform on Monday, March 2.

Groups working outside of the hospital have been active for some time--the Favor Committee, making favors for the dietary trays for special occasions; the Toy-Making Group, making stuffed toys for the children in the Pediatric Department and the Ways and Means Committee, actively engaged in fund-raising projects to purchase equipment for the new Occupational Therapy Department.

It is anticipated that the services of the Auxiliary will prove invaluable to the hospital in the community.

SAINT PATRICK -- APOSTLE OF IRELAND

When St. Patrick was a young lad he was captured by pirates and carried as a slave from Scotland to Ireland. He was 22 when an angel appeared and told him to run away westward. A ship carried him across the sea back to Scotland.....He stayed only long enough to visit his parents and friends, then went on to France to become a priest.

The Druids were very angry when, some years later, the former slave returned as an Apostle. They begged the Irish king to condemn Patrick. On Easter Eve when King Leoghaire had commanded all fires in Ireland to be put out until he lit the signal blaze at the castle, every one obeyed but Patrick. On the hill of Slane the saint had kindled the Paschal fire.

The king was angry and sent the Druids to put the fire out. The pagan priests rushed down into the valley and up the hill of Slane. They poured water, dirt and stones on the fire which symbolized the light of Christ. But the more they tried, the brighter the fire burned.

The next day St. Patrick pleaded for the true faith before King Leoghaire.

The Druids challenged the saint to many trials. By the power of God, Patrick cubdued them time after time. Then the King admitted the saint's power was great, but said he could not understand the doctrine -- especially that of the Blessed Trinity.

St. Patrick plucked from the ground a green shamrock and used it to show One God and Three Persons, pointing out the three leaves bound in unity by the stem.

The Apostle was given permission by the king to preach the Faith in Ireland. He established the Church on lasting foundations throughout the country.
