

Surgeons Here Do Total Hip Procedure

Orthopedic surgeons at the St. Cloud Orthopedics Associates, with offices in Hospital report a high incidence of success Doctor's Park. using a new procedure which totally replaces hip joints in older patients.

Dr. Jerry A. Iverson said the operation involves removal of the original ball and socket hip joint, which is then replaced by a plastic socket and a vitallium or stainless steel ball held in place with acrylic cement. The surgery takes from two to four hours.

"The doctors at the St. Cloud Hospital have been doing this total hip replacement procedure for about six months now, "Dr. Iverson stated. "And, the general success rate is about 95% for having a pain-free, stable, mobile and durable hip joint. "

This surgery is often called for in older patients (usually not below the age of 60) who suffer from degenerative arthritis.


The procedure has evolved with modern technology to its present stage through multiple trials and errors, Dr. Iverson explained.

Dr. John Barton first attempted to mobilize a diseased hip in 1826 by creating an artificial joint in the proximal femur (upper thigh bone). Since then, tissue interposition, gold foil, pig's bladders, glass and metal have been introduced into the joint in order to provide a pain-free articulation with Two Grads on HOPE Mission motion.







2 TPSP . MARGARINE 2 TPSP. FLOUR I CUP MILK 1 /2 CUP CHEESE, SHREDDED 1 PKG. FROZEN, COOKED SPINACH!

1/4 CUP BUTTERED BREAD CRUMBS 1/8 TSP. PEPPER

1/4 TSP. SALT.

MELT MARGARINE OVER LOW HEAT. BLEND IN FLOUR AND SEASONINGS. STIR UNTIL MIXTURE IS SMOOTH.

REMOVE FROM HEAT. STIR IN MILK. BRING TO BOILING STIRRING CONSTANTLY. BOIL 1 MINUTE.

3. ADD CHEESE. STIR UNTIL MELTED.

4. FOLD CHEESE SAUCE INTO COOKED, WELL-DRAINED SPINACH.

5. PUT INTO CASSEROLE. SPRINKLE WITH BREAD CRUMBS.

BAKE AT 350 DEGREES JUST UNTIL BREAD CRUMB'S ARE GOLDEN BROWN .

A psychology major, Pat was president of the Psychology Club at SJU, served on the University Building


